Announcing an event

How to some more

By Kevin Bray Greetings to all...

It seems that my previous article about the balloon technique I use got a lot of attention. There have been several captains request a follow up. The part that seems especially difficult is this question... "What do you do with the wires"??? I apologize that my previous article did not cover this part of the process. Please see accompanying pictures. Picture 1 is not very focused but it shows step 4

completed. Picture 2 shows step 6 completed.
Picture 3 shows a fully engulfed receiver and wires that accompany it. Here it is step by step...

Step 1:

Purchase several sized balloons.

Step 2:


take the receiver antenna and lay it across the body of the receiver.

Step 3:

Fill a small balloon with air.

Step 4:

push the end of the receiver that the antenna comes out into the balloon. While doing so, allow the air in the balloon to escape. The



balloon will engulf the receiver.

Step 5


Organize your servo wires and antenna wire neatly. Lay them against the body of the receiver that has just been covered by the balloon.

Step 6:

Inflate a larger balloon (preferably an elongated one), Take the end of the receiver that has all of the wires attached and press it into the balloon. As you do this, allow the air in the balloon to deflate around the receiver and the wires.

Step 7 (optional)

Repeat step 6 with yet another balloon and engulf the wires. One thing I like about this process is that




if you ever want to get into the receiver again, all you have to do is blow into the balloon and it automatically inflates thus releasing the receiver. The balloon can be reused once corrections to the receiver have been made. I personally do not think getting into the receiver is a common occurance (unless you are changing out crystals).

Step 8 (optional)

Tie of wires end, use tool dip around balloons...

I used steps 1 through 6 and had excellent results. The first place I heard of this technique was from Robert Rucker. To my knowledge, he does not use it. I have used steps 1-8 on my rudder servo for this years combat. I hope to report back at the end of the season as to the results.



Construction Plan Sets Available

(These plan sets were at one time called 'Legal construction Plan Sets')

It may be necessary to ignore some suggestions on these plan sets to build a model that is legal for the many different 'Combat Clubs' that exist today! These plans are drawn to 144th (1/144) scale.

Page 1 of the 'Two page plan sets' consists of, in most cases, a side view, top view (plan view) and a bow view. Some of the sets also include a stern view.

Page 2 consists of drawings of all the rib (frame) outlines, keel outline, main and subdeck outlines for use in cutting these parts out of wood. The 'One page plan sets' consists of, in most cases, a side view, top view and bow view. Some also show a stern view. There is also a body view, (ribs), either on the plan set or on a separate sheet of paper. All plans were drawn by Jeff Poindexter unless otherwise noted.

Scale Vs Function

This year at Nats, more people than ever slid rubber or plastic tubes over their cannon barrels to protect them from bee bee damage. I felt it looked terrible, and especially on the best of scale ship! I also felt that it was happening because people were buying their barrels instead of knowing how easy they were to build. Well, I used stainless steel barrels and I had 9 extra, so no need for this old veteran to put those trashy protecting tubes on my scale ship. They're condoms for the guns, kind of pornographic, don't you think? Certainly not to be used in public!

After Nats, but still at Nats, Lief and I had a one on one. I thought I won, but when the holes were counted he had won. I wondered why. There was another time when I had opened up on the starboard bow of an ugly British thing, but when I counted its hits, the starboard bow was not that bad off.?

Stan came to see me this CHRISTmas and he put a piece of typing paper on a box, placed it about 4 feet from the end of his stern guns, and emptied his triple stern guns into this paper. He noted that his beebees hit an area about 2.5 inches in diameter. Most curious What would my guns do? I tried it, but just with one gun, and it blasted an area about 9" in diameter!

I have been aiming, indeed practicing to hit a area about at the water line and an inch above in the bow. What a fantasy! Even if the guns are aimed at that area, the odds of the beebees hitting there are unlikely. In fact, I could miss thew hole ship, either sail over its decks, or splash wasted in the water before reaching the target.

Looking closely at my barrels, I could see tiny dents, beebee dents. When I replaced my dented gun barrels, I got similar results as Stan. I am now thinking about armoring my gun barrels. It's kind of a losing thought, but perhaps the smarter way. I have noticed that I don't have any dents under my barrels where they were covered with a sleeve of K&S brass. Perhaps, this not so noticeable material, is good enough to armor stainless steal barrels.??

What about you? Measure four feet from the end of your barrels. Clothes pin a sheet of paper onto a cardboard box, and shoot a magazine into it. I "thrrew out" the hole farthest from the center, and then measured the "diameter of death" that each gun dealt out. The smaller the target area, the better my guns will put the beebees on the target. Its a cheap and easy way to improve your ship.


Wade uses Swampworks barrels, and he said "that the more powerful the cannon the more accurate the cannon". He tightened up the barrels, which increases the power, and, it's accuracy.







How I Won the War—on Only 10 Minutes a Day

As I look over my sad
excuse for a dockyard, I am
dismayed at what I see. The
hulls of a half-dozen of
Germany's finest ships
strewn about like sailboats
after a hurricane. The Konig
waits for her fourth gun; the
Lutzow is only half-planked;
the Seydlitz is without a
radio; the Scharnhorst is
nearly ready for it's fiberglass

bottom; the Steir is ready for its motor; the Posen is merely a showy display of superstructure over a hull that is as empty as the Tinman's chest; the mighty Bismarck, a Swampworks kit that I received as a Christmas present from my wife over a year ago, stands majestically atop a pile of sawdust left over from the Carter Administration.

The piles of tools and supplies are precariously stacked in towering piles that would put Fibber McGee and Molly to shame. The two chairs in the dockyard have a board between the top of the backs of the chairs to provide additional work space. The bottle of jet glue is somewhere...

Yet this is just standard operating procedure for me. I have too much going on—three little boys, graduate school homework, a few hobbies, freelance work—and very little time. So when I do work on the boats, I don't waste time by cleaning up!

And every once in awhile, I notice that I am ignoring the boats entirely. When that happens, I fall back on the "magnificent obsession" plan that helped me earn the 1986 Rookie-of-the-Year award. That plan is simple and easy, but gets the job done.

First, admit you have too much going on in your life...don't worry and fret. Second, try to spend just 10 minutes a day in your dockyard, no more..no less. That ten minutes is amazing! I can put most of my tools away in just 10 minutes. I can add a sheet of balsa to a hull in 10 minutes. I can put on a waterline in just 10 minutes. I can even find the glue bottle in 10 minutes.

Best of all, I can lose track of time in 10 minutes...and that's how I do it. Just 10 minutes at a time. Make the commitment to put in those 10 minutes every day. Your fleet is counting on

Make motel reservations NOW, then you can cancel later if it turns out you can't make it after all.


THE LAKE. Ritter Springs Park. Just Northwest of the city out in the country. To find it, just follow the convoy from the Motel 6 on Saturday morning.

Here's looking forward to a Great Battle. See ya' there, Steve SWAMPY Milholland



Battle Report: Houston

Gentlemen,

In this sortie, we proved the ineffectiveness of our offensive capabilities by firing all 125 rounds from our guns and neither of us scoring a hull penatrating hit. There was some superstructure damage but as Fluegel pointed out, My ship can only get better looking! :-)

After driving from Dallas to Houston with Fluegel, I have

decided to concentrate much of my off season time this winter getting my ship more scale. A rookie note here: Any rookie reading this would be wise to concentrate an equal amount of time into making your ship battle worthy and making it look good. 



Swampy's workshop is now making resin molded turrets available as an "add on" for those of you who have some of our warships kits. These same turrets are also now being supplied as "standard issue" in our kits in place of the old vacuum molded turrets we used to supply.



table . And you can have a "L" type work station.


