For the first time at NATS, Will Montgomery, the CD, tested all CO2 regulators to ensure that they were operating at the proper pressure. Although most passed the test without problem, roughly 25% of the regulators were over the 150psi limit when first tested, some as much as 50psi over the limit. Many of regulators were corrected by replacing the internal spring, while others required some work to remove internal corrosion. Although every regulator eventually passed the test, we should all work harder to make sure that our regulators are within the specified limits all of the time. DON'T DEPEND ON THE MANUFACTUROR TO SEND YOU THE PROPER REGULATOR, TEST IT YOURSELF OR HAVE IT TESTED.

Have fun at the upcoming Fall Regionals and let's close out the Fluegel Signature Year with a bang (as well as a number of Allied sinks).

Monday Battling

By Marty Hayes. Greenbriar Lake - July 21, 1997 - First Day of Battle at 1997 **Nationals**

The day was clear, sunny, hot, and humid. The clear lake lay at the bottom of a sizable hill (about 20 feet high) and the setting was within the rolling hills (Maryland Mountains). A tent city had been erected

to house the combatants consisting of two large tents (20x40 and 20x20) together with individual tents scattered along the hill top. The area was enclosed by yellow caution tape with several openings to carry the boats and equipment through when loading and unloading.

The fleets, 13 Axis and 22 Allied, assembled slowly for the first day of Battle. Pictures of the entire fleet assembled were made just prior to the closing of the fleets in this epic and titanic battle.

The first battle consisted of the Allied fleet taking over the entire left segment of the ~9 acre pond with the small Axis fleet starting on the right. Fluegel operated far out in the pond with his Bismarck in hopes of luring some of the Allied rookies out for individual attention. The action was very confused as the Axis units had been cautioned to fight fast and leave the pond rapidly in hopes that the Allied fleet would not have time to expend their large stock of bbs.

At the beginning of the first sortie, the combat "worm" swung even harder against the Axis as two of their major units called "out of control" and "declared sunk" within minutes of the beginning of the battle. Steve Andrews Kongo declared before the enemy could bring their guns on target, but the Rookie Bismarck of Mike Torda took some damage before declaring. The first sortie was a confused melee of mixed action with most of the Allied major units (Class 6's)

engaging early to the right of the pond and the Class 4's holding back until the first "on five" of the Axis fleet were declared. The limited number of vessels remaining on the Axis side weaved and shot their way through the Allied jammed waters. No additional sinks on the Axis side but the Axis were only able to sink Larry Dahl's Tiger on the Allied side during this sortie, not enough to make up for the two declared sinks on the Axis side.

Points scored for this sortie was Allied forces 9475 points against the Axis, Axis forces 5930 points against the Allied.

Excerpts from the Captains:

D.W. Fluegel - looks like an Axis Victory! I got the haymaker on Don Fisher and due-due-due, there it was 22 below (course he was dead in



the water, but anyway).

Chris Pearce - ran in, found a bunch of ships and slugged away, it was good

Ronny Hunt - They ran good

Austin Keels - Had a great time, but didn't do much damage. Larry Dahl - pump wiring burnt out.

Steve Milholland - Fiberglass is great, fought the green ships!

The second sortie was much like the first except that at the beginning Mike Blattau and Paul Broring didn't make the launch and at the end, Marty Hayes' Nagato, Dave Haynes' Nagato and even Frank Pittelli's Bacon Maker all found a watery. The reduced numbers of the Axis fleet was kept running throughout the second sortie and could not pause to do much damage to the opposition. A mistake made by the Axis forces at this point in the week was to engage mainly the front line of the Allied fleet (the heavy and experienced units), leaving the remainder free to mop up or engage single enemy

Excerpts from captains:

D.W.Fluegel - Dave and I worked the left side of the lake. When Chris Pearce came along I was mossed and called five when I should have called "30 sec Moss"

Dave Haynes - had a lose impeller, on five and was in the middle of multitudes of enemy ships (didn't get the license number of the truck that hit me)

Bob Eakin - Everyone was getting into everyone else's way. Had a great time.

Andrews was still out

due to the

interference problems which plagued his ship at the first battle, the solution to this problem was found later also. During this battle the Axis tried a new strategy, some five or six Axis captains commanded

their ships from the opposite side of the lake from where everyone launched and thereby could get a better look at the battle nearby when enemy ships came across to engage them. This created a "safe" haven for any Axis ship who could make it to the redoubt. This was used by Dave Haynes with his Nagato after engaging heavy battle with the Allied rear fleet components, made his way across the lake to the encircling arms of the Axis large ship fleet. Pursuing elements of the Allied heavy fleet broke off the chase as they neared the protected zone. There were heard some co!

mments from the Allied fleet who felt this was "bad" behavior on the part of the Axis fleet. This zone was eventually, by a few enemy units (Pearce and Pate), but overall worked well for the Axis throughout this battle. Fluegel again operated independently (as he would all week) on the outer fringe of the Allied left flank.

During the first sortie, both of the rookie units of the Axis fleet (the Torda's Lutzow and Bismarck) were set upon early and dispatched in the first sortie. The little Lutzow took an amazing 36/3/14 before plunging to the water deep. The Allied forces paid in the second sortie with Don Cole's Alabama, Jim Cutler's Cruiser and Larry Dahl's Tiger all sinking

Austin Keel - I got mossed up when chasing Fluegel - Moss was a

Larry Dahl - [Reporter - Did the Curly Curse follow you here?] - No Comment! - the pump connection came off inside the boat so that the pump was only circulating the water.

Dave Haynes - Good time, we worked as a team! Chris and Pate started chasing me at the beginning ... I mean dogged chasing! but I lead them toward the main force and they broke off.

D.W. Flugel - I was still playing with the Rookies, and they are getting better already. Toward the end of my five, I came in too close, too early and Brian Eliason got some hits just before I went off five (about 12 sec left). I didn't know he was that good.

Bob Eakin - Chasing Fluegel will wear you out.

Brian Eliason - I was disappointed in the first sortie, when none of the Axis would come over and play. However, the second sortie was fun because Doc found that the Allied backfield of inexperienced people were fun to play with. He just lets them run into each other and has a lot of fun. Also Fluegel who was on five, decided it would be fun taunt the rookies. So I made my way out to him and shot him at least 10 times with my forward sidemount (under the waterline). Fluegel then said "evidently there is a man out here and 'Help!"

Stan Watkins - I got Frank near the end of the 2nd. sortie and put in

about 5 hits and managed to shot Will at the end too.

Steve Milholland - eh-eh-ehhhhh (Steve's Exact words)

Jim Pate - I was not impressed with our (Allied) performance

Chris Pearce - I took them all on, and gave more that I took, although I did take a lot. I was not terribly impressed with the new Musashis. (Ed. Note: Neither Chris or Jim would stay near the Musashis for more than 5 seconds.)

Will Montgomery - Jim and Chris and I battled most of this sortie. Toward the end, I had a NC chasing me, and I said to Chris "Aren't you on five?", but it turned out to be Pate, and I drove him of with damage to the bow. (Note: Pate claimed and the damage looked like it that he got damaged high in the bow on the rear overhang of the hanger deck of the Musashi.) Pate said "It was my own fault really" and Will said "you were pushing up against me

Nathan Blattau - took a lot of triples (stern guns) in the left side and bow but damage control seems to be working well. Also on of the solenoids is giving me trouble but I can fix that tonite.

Mike Blattau - I accidentally ran into Ronny Hunt and caved in the side of his boat! Reporter - "did he sink?" Mike - No, I was side by side with the Indiana, exchanging

Steve Andrews - I didn't battle (due to radio problems) the entire day. But I have been enjoying the carnage on the lake in both battles. It seems to me that the rookies were serious aggressive this year. I believe that the (combat) worm has turned during the second battle, giving the Axis momentum into Tuesday. My problem with the radio is now known and will be fixed by tomorrow. The problem was the nut behind the wheel in this case.

Paul Broring - I was over on the left side of the lake and the only other Axis there was Fluegel. With about eight of them. I took 22 below so they are shooting reasonable. Don Fisher - It was a lot of fun. I had a great day. I maybe got the worst of it but it was a great experience. Jeff Cutler - Better than the car problems before I got here. I am using Don Fisher's Exeter

Frank Pittelli - we had some cloud cover which interfered with the Battlestar Combat System so we had a little area on the lake without satellite support. Fluegel decided to go in there, without support. and we were worried until we realized that the enemy only had 16 units in the area. On the other side of the lake (with satellite coverage) we began to see how the Musashi's synchronous gun control are really starting to show where this hobby is going. The sight of the Musashis Squadron dominating the lake by pounding with twin side mounts at North Carolinas on both sides was truly inspiring! The two top North Carolina Captains, Jim Pate and Chris Pearce, are feeling the damage as they have spent nearly two hours repairing their vessels... (reporter's note: Frank went on and on but the tane ran out)

Mutsu battleship. These three ships were intent on out flanking the Allies and doing damage to whoever may venture into their path. Fluegel, "Myself, Torda and Dirty went out and around to out flank and get to some of the slower Allied ships, happy hunting grounds, we saw a cruiser (Exeter) listing and we wanted to get in and shoot it." The fun was not long lived as the Mutsu lost control due to a prop shaft coming loose and sliding back into the rudders causing them to jamb. Five out of control was called and the ship drifted to shore. There was no help to expect, as it was stated in the Axis meeting that if you get isolated, there are not enough ships to

For the second day of Nates the battlers were greeted with clouds and rain . For the Axis fleet, the gloom had actually began the day before, as they were unable to win either of the two fleet battles that were fought on Monday. While the Axis fleet still faced the disparity in number of ships , there was renewed hope that the Allied fleet would be defeated on this day and the Axis could continue the week on a winning binge. Fluegel stated,"Rain, as the earth wept over the injustice as our (Axis) rookies were being slaughtered by their bullies!" As the start of battle neared, the rain lifted as if a sign for the Axis of the good times to come.

While waiting for the rain to let up, most were enjoying the newspaper articles and pictures from Monday. Ali Zinat was also celebrating his birthday in an obvious manly fashion. The rain and wind acted together to move the moss, that was a problem on Mon., to the far side of the battling area. All of the clear area would be needed ,as there were thirty three ships about to join battle to decide who would be the victor in fleet battle #3. Of this number, twenty-two were Allied ships and the rest were Axis vessels.

The majority of the Allied ships launched of the left side of a large tree/bush that visually divided the lake into two halves. The main body of the Axis fleet launched to the right of this visual divider with the exception of two Bismarck, and one

The Mutsu took a lot of damage during this time but managed to stay afloat. The Bismarck of Torda also experienced control problems, loosing reverse and getting pinned against shore. It was declared sunk shortly after. The Axis also lost the Kongo in this sortie while battling on the other end of the lake. Overall it was not a good start in the first sortie for the Axis with two ships sunk while the Allies did not loose any. Allies10,275 Axis 4200.

In the Axis meeting prior to the second sortie, Frank took partial blame for the fiasco because he had not read the inspirational message of the day, from Wade, before the first sortie. For the second sortie, we observed a moment of silence for Curly and then the message from Wade was read to the Axis captains. The second sortie began withe the fleets launching on their respective sides of the lake. The Bismarck and Mutsu decided to go after the North Carolina of Matt Keels. As the fleets merged, it became extremely difficult to locate the target so a cruiser was selected as the next object of attention. 

famous Paul Harvy had mentioned the goings on during his noon broadcast, and this brought good cheer to all.

The Axis plan was to attempt to get through this event with as little fleet damage as possible. We were not going to send any convoy ships out until the last thirty seconds of the hour long event to deny the Allies the joy of the sinking. We would have to absorb the penalty points and hope that we could sink enough of their convoy ships to make up the difference. Also, there would be no organized effort to guard our forward base targets. There would be ships assigned to shoot their targets. One ship would be on the water at all times as was called for in the

rules. N. Blattau with his Shinano was assigned this duty. To attack their targets. Torda's Bismarck and brother Doug's Lutzow would lead, with Fluegel as their backup. All other ships were to attack their convoy ships will all effort and ammo.

The Allies would have the great advantage of more warships. This is more telling in a campaign battle than in a regular fleet battle. and they were quick to press this home. A small LST was launched and quickly set upon by the Axis attack ships. In short time it was sunk with only four or five holes in the hull. During this time there were numerous Allied ships eagerly waiting for the launching of an Axis convoy ship. The Allies then set a large ship, the General Mitchell on its way. In the last thirty seconds of the conflict the Axis launch three convoy ships to avoid loosing the penalty points. Shots are still being taken by the bombardment ship Lutzow at the remaining Allied targets but it is too late. The Allies can now make convoy runs unmolested because the Axis have no ammo, the victory is theirs. Final score for the event is Allies 5,825 to Axis 2,100.

Proposal #1 - Waive NATS Fee For Founders. Waive the entrance fee for the Founding Fathers who attend the 20th National Competition (NATS '98).

Proposal #2 - Define Frequency Allocation Criteria. Add the following Frequency Allocation Criteria to the beginning of the Battle Conduct section to clarify how frequencies are to be assigned by the Freq Czar. Insert into section III.B Battle Conduct, as rule III.B.1

PROPOSED WORDING:

The Freq Czar will maintain a Freq List that will be used as the official record to reduce the number of frequency conflicts at ALL sanctioned events, including, but not restricted to, NATS.

- a) The Freq Czar has the operational authority to allocate frequencies as he sees fit throughout the year. The E-board reserves the right to settle any disputes that may arise between captains and the Freq Czar.
- b) Only captains in good standing as IR/CWCC members (paid dues and battled in a sanctioned event during last 2 years) will be assigned a frequency on the Freq List. (First time rookies will be

We all adjourned from the lake briefly for a quick dinner at our favorite watering holes, and then returned to the lake shortly before dusk to prepare for Night Battle. Many battlers, mostly Allied, chose to stay at the hotel and hope that it was canceled due to the rain, but fortunately, (for the Axis), the rain cleared up just as the sun was setting, and those few Allies who were prepared and at lakeside got ready to have the tables turned on them in the darkness.

assigned a frequency on a tentative basis prior to their first battle.)

- c) Captains may only be assigned a single "primary" frequency. Secondary frequencies may be shown on the Freq List to help resolve conflicts, but they are provided for reference purposes only.
- d) The Freq List, as of Dec 31st, will be included in the rules packet sent out every year. It may also be posted in HullBusters or on the Internet at the discretion of the Freq Czar.
- e) The following preferences will be given by the Freq Czar when assigning frequencies:
- 1) Any captain already on the Freq List who battled in the last NATS can keep "the same frequency" during the next year.
- 2) Any captain already on the Freq List who battled in any sanctioned event during the last year can keep "the same frequency" during the next year.
- 3) All other frequencies are assigned on a "first-come-first-served" basis at the discretion of the Freq Czar, depending on the physical location of the captain and the number and location of events usually attended. Captains should check with the Freq Czar "before" purchasing new radios to "temporarily reserve" an open frequency

pending the purchase of the radio.

- f) The Freq Czar has the right to request captains to change frequencies in order to eliminate a conflict during a sanctioned event, based on the preferences listed above, with the goal of minimizing the total number of changes needed.
- g) Prior to NATS, the Freq Czar will coordinate with the Site Host to determine any potential conflicts involving the captains who have registered for NATS. If a conflict is found, the captains involved will be contacted to resolve the conflict prior to NATS.

Proposal #3 - Cleanup Offices and Duties Match-up the responsibilities as stated in the "Offices and Duties" to the real-world allocation of work. See Constitution, Article III.C, Offices and Duties

After counting and patching at the hotel, the Axis were relieved, because unlike 1994, they knew they could return home from Nats comfortable in the knowledge that they'd won more than water volleyball. However, the Allies could also go to sleep comfortable in the knowledge that after this sharp kick in their complacency, the kid gloves would be coming off on Thursday, and that in daylight, with the full Allied fleet out on the water, it would be the Axis who would spend the next two days wondering whether or not they should declare sunk. The only question in our minds was how long it would take to make up our 4000 point setback. Could we still break the 30,000 point barrier? Only time would tell, and time was getting very short

sidemount rules as follows: Classes 4-7 may have sidemounted cannons (any cannon which is angled more than 15 degrees from the longitudinal centerline of the model). Warships in these classes are allowed sidemounts as follows:

- a) Ships under 720': These ships may carry a maximum of two sidemount cannons with a maximum of one firing cannon covering any specific side. On these ships, one specific fixed quadrant shall be left unarmed at all times. The definition of quadrants are: forward and stern quadrants are 30 degree segments arranged 15 degrees either side of the ship's longitudinal centerline; side quadrants are those extending from the end of the bow quadrant to the beginning of the stern quadrant on either side.
- b) Ships between 720' and 850': These ships may carry a maximum of three sidemount cannons with a maximum of two firing cannons covering a specific side. When two cannons are firing in the same quadrant, they must be in separate turrets. Axis Classes:Bismarck, Scharnhorst, Littorio, Nagato, Kongo Allied Classes: Vanguard, King George V, Courageous, Furious, Renown, N. Carolina, Alaska
- c) Ships greater than 850' and Richelieu Class: These ships may carry a maximum of four sidemount cannons with a maximum of two firing cannons covering any specific side. When two cannons are firing into the same quadrant, they may be mounted in a single turret. All quadrants may be covered.
