REPORT ON THE IRCWCC RULES COMITTEE MEETING

Elected Executive Board for the 1999-2000 battling season:

President: Steve Andrews

Contest Director: Tom Tanner Site Host: Depends on selected Nationals site.

I would like to congratulate the club on a well run, amicable and efficient rules meeting this year. The rules comittee formed two subcomittees: The <u>first subcomittee</u> is to study the effects of CO2 pressure on projectile velocity, and to look into ways to improve the safety of our cannon systems. Comittee members are: Stan Watkins (Chairman), Larry Ricci, Tim Filemeyer, and Don Fisher. The comittee is to submit a report by March 1st.

The second subcomittee is to rewrite the campaign rules. The rewritten rules will be posted on the email lists before December 31 and will go out as a suplement to this year's rules package. The rewritten campaign rules will be field tested at the 2000 Nationals on Tuesday. A 2/3 majority vote of participating captains at the 2000 Nationals will be necessary to continue testing the rewritten campaign rules on Thursday, otherwise we will revert to the Campaign rules currently in place. The rewritten rules will be officially proposed at the 2000 rules comittee meeting to replace the Campaign rules currently in place. Comittee members are: Ron Hunt (Chairman), Marty Hayes, Mike Torda, Cameron Maury, Ron Thibault, and Chris Decker.

SPECIFICS OF THE RULE PROPOSALS

 The Executive Board will take the steps necessary to incorporate the IRCWCC as a not for profit coproration in a state of its own choosing as soon as possible. The current officers shall be the officers of the corporation. Membership shall be the same in the corporaton as it is now.

*Secretary's note - the officers of the corporation will change each year when a new Executive Board is elected.

2. Add to Article I Section A of the constitution:

"1. All members of the IRCWCC shall conduct themselves in a gentlemanly and sportsmanlike manner in all club forums and activities. Mambers found not to be conducting themselves properly will be subject to discipline by the Executive Board.

Disciplinary procedure

 a. A captain may lodge a written complaint with the President of the Executive Board within 10 days of an incident.

b. The President may chose to mediate reconsiliation between the parties or chose to present the complaint to the Executive Board for review.

c. The Executive Board, after reviewing the written statements of those involved may elect to discipline the offending captain by up to a 1 year suspension of club privelages."

3. Add to Article V of the constitution:

"D. The Contest Director of any sanctioned event may at his discretion eject a captain from an event for any safety or conduct reason for up to the duration of the event."

4. Move Article III Section C.2.c. of the consitution "Approves sanctions for club events and Contest Directors for those events." to Article III C.3.g. In Article V Section A Replace Vice President with Secretary. *Secretary's note - this moves the responsibility for sanctioning an event from the Vice President to the Secretary. The secretary needs to know what events are sanctioned and who was involved in order to effectively complete the rest of his duties.

5. In the Bylaws II.H.1 Warship Classes table and the shiplist move Class 1 "Monitors less than 7000 tons" from the 1.0 Unit to the 1.5 Units section in order to correct an error from the 1999 ballot.
6. In order to clarify that multiple stage and multiple motor pumps are not allowed, Change Bylaws II.G.3 from "A pump motor shall be no larger than the largest propulsion motor in the model." to "The pump motor shall be no larger than the largest propulsion motor in the model." Also change Bylaws II.G.4 from "All pumps must be electric." to "A pump shall have only one electric motor and one impeller."

 Add Bylaw II.G.7 "A pump outlet will be aimed no more than 10 degrees above horizontal or within 10 degrees of vertical."

8. Replace Bylaws II.C.2 and II.C.3 with the following:

"All rudders must function. The maximum total movable rudder area shall be by model class as follows:

*Secretary's note - this adds 25% to the rudder area for single rudder ships, increasing their viability as combat ships and hopefully increasing the variety of warships on the water.

 Add Nelson class to Bylaw II.H.1.a.iii (Allowed two side shooting guns in a single turret) in order to accommodate their unusual turret arrangement.

10. Replace III.8.a with:

"To determine the points awarded to a particular ship, the following computation is performed:

i The Total Damage Points of the opposing fleet is computed by adding all damage points for each ship in that fleet.

ii The Total Weight Factor of all ships in the ship's fleet is computed by adding a full-weight factor for each ship that participated in both sorties plus a half-weight factor for each ship that participated in only one sortie

iii Each ship is awarded a portion of the Total Damage Points equal to their Weight Factor (full or half) divided by the Total Weight Factor. iv Individual penalties assigned to the ship are deducted from the ship's battle points to produce the final score for the captain of that ship."


* Note - This approach is easier to compute than the method used in the past, eliminates the need to count damage in between sorties, and yields the same individual standings. This approach was field tested at NATS '98 and NATS '99 with no problems.

11. Add Bylaw IV.B.8

"8. Brian Spychalski Memorial Award.

 a. This is a voted award given to a captain who shows good sportsmanship, a spirit of helpfullness, and best exemplifies the

behavior we would like to see from all battlers.

 A panel appointed by the Contest Director and/or the club President will chose who will be awarded this trophy.

c. The winner of this award will hold it until the Awards Banquet at the next Annual Championship. The winner is responsible for seeing that the trophy is present at the next Awards Banquet even if he is not able to attend."

*Secretary's note - I was surprised that this award was not in our rules, especially since it is nearly as old as the Von Fluegel. I am also surprised that the "Most Feared" awards are not in the rules either, and best of scale is not divided into warship and convoy.

Upon arriving there was open excitement for the quality of the




Sunday was testing day, and like the days before it to was raining.

Dave Larence's Nagoto failed the hull hardness test, and was stripped of its too-hard-hull-skin at lake side, by Dave. A number of helpful captains joined David and that night the Nagoto had a new, soft hull skin. That night the CD (contest director) lead the captains meeting. Twenty seven males were in attendance. A number of dads were there with their "captaining kids". A 10:00 AM start time was voted on for all fleet battles, replacing the traditional 9:00. Strategy meeting followed for about the next 40 minutes. Fluegel noted "there seems to be a polarization, two groups, good guys, and Allies".

The teams had been advertised as one sided. The Axies were almost winners by default. But the announced

> 14 Axies to 3 Allies did not pan out. It was essentially a tie, with the Allies ahead in units, 49 to 46. The Axies admiral. Gross Admiral Mike Torda, split the Axies team into two large groups. Each group was a mix of slow WWI ("hug and slug") ships, as well as powerful, fast WWII ("run and gun") ships, with a sprinkle of cruisers for innocents. Admiral Torda's

idea was that Allied admiral Steve Milholland would stay away from the short WWI ships, and concentrate on our fast ships, and rookies. The Allies would also dump their rounds fast, call five, and escape our (Axies) superior number of guns. By mixing the squads into blended ships they would have to battle WWI ships (hug and slug) every time they engaged their targeted ships. It was also felt that the Allies would not attack, but play it safe, and fight for a win in a low scoring battle. In order to force them into engaging the Axies, the two groups were deployed with the Allies between the two Axies groups, and then one group would sail out, away from the shore, then return into the Allies, the shore and the

boat, but the 34 second struggling Texas of founder Jeff Poindexter. He had problems the first half of the week finding the right combination of motors and props. 

I am not so sure he made it up as he went to the local security people and they came to see us in a bad mood. Anyway, things like that, real or not remind us of safety, and our vulnerableness to being sued.

On a lighter note, the Axies, who traditionally win night battle, even when we loose every other event, lost night battle this year. Mike Torda had a bad power switch, and no power. He sank about 8 feet from shore in very shallow water. His lights remained above the water ,as they were on the mast. Mike had radio control of the lights, and from 6 time to time would illuminate a ship. When I turned on my ship's lights, they illuminated a cruiser with a transit stern. That would be American! After maybe two seconds of fireing rear guns, the Axies ship Belgrono (sold to Axies Argentina before the end of the war, a former US cruiser) had 29 holes above the water line and five holes on the water

line. This unfortunately may have been my best stern gunnery of the week. The IJN Aoba also sank. The Allies were out numbered, but they were better than the Axies. Score: Allies 7,420, Axis 4,865. It was becoming difficult to tell the guys we could still win the war.

The Day After

The day began bright and clear as the Axis, stung by their first loss in Night Battle in many years, took to the water on



The Axis, in a controversial move, launched the badly damaged Graf Spee into a bay on the left side of the battling area, in a spot not accessible from the main area unless you travelled outside the normal battling area boundary. The Graf Spee survived, but further launches in that area were "verboten." Meanwhile, the

Another target of the battle was founder Jeff



out of ammunition, still cruising the lake in search of targets.

Meanwhile, the Derfflinger, run by Tim Filemyr, took up the slack for Tom Tanner by taking 28-8-33, proving once again the superior damage control of German vessels. He was heard to remark that "the Scouting Division performed flawlessly. It hunted down the enemy and got the crap kicked out of it." But, for all the damage the Axis took, they chased the allies from the lake and at the end of the sortie there were five Axis boats, most

Aoba, and the Graf Spee, among other ships, shot down all of the allied targets, while Orrill Ferguson's Tirpitz used its bulk to protect the Axis ones (he saved 4 at 125 points each!) The Axis lost the Aoba after it reloaded and was launched with only reverse throttle working. In return the allies lost Don Fisher's LST. When all the counting was done, the Axis were victorious once more, deflating the allies spirits and giving them a taste of what was to occur the glorious Friday morning to come.


