

By Fluegel For the first time in the hobby, new forms of BBs appeared at lake side. It seems that good old Copper Head (daisy; 10 for one cent) BBs are not so good, like, not so round. Quality control seems to occur in our gun barrels, bad BBs jam, good ones pass through. About 6 captains purchased Olympic grade BBs (5 for one cent). One captain even purchased small ball bearings (1 for five cents?).

The Olympic grade BBs were a bit larger, and had their own set of jamming problems. The ball bearings were too expensive, and methods other than throwing money at the problem were soon in vogue. Pearce poured his BBs in a pie pan and rolled them about, discarding the bad ones. One captain was trying to borrow a micrometer, I'm uncertain where that method ended up. ## Nats Tuesday


The Allies held a grudge against Charley Steven's Fuso and decided to put her down. Charley, seeing the amount of firepower

The Axis B fleet now went out to fight the Allied A fleet. Prior to battle being called, the Axis admiral assented to the B fleet request to "sink us some Allies". The B fleet organized itself with it three battleships screened by three Lutzow class cruisers and the Tre Kroner light cruiser. Arrayed against this force was two lowas, three North Carolinas, an Invincible, Chicago, and Sumatra. In this target rich environment, the Axis B fleet went into a feeding frenzy. The first target was Dana Graham's Prince of Wales. However, it soon became apparent that the Allies valued this ship and would defend her to the last. After several attempts to cut her out, The Axis grew weary of quadruple stern guns and double side mounts from lowas and decided to go after targets of opportunity. No Allied ships were sunk in the first sortie, but the Axis lost Tre Kroner and

Gneisenau.

The second sortie of the Axis A fleet started off with an effort to finish off the wounded Valiant. Valiant was

While the Axis B fleet was (erroneously) considered to be weak in the attack, the Allied B fleet contained fierce combatants who preferred close combat to sniping from afar. 
lightly defended by her teammates but put up a fight worthy of her name. Alas, it was not enough and she soon fell victim to Axis gunnery. The remainder of the sortie was fought without incident, and the fleets returned to port.

Having dispelled the vicious rumors that the Axis B fleet was all run and no gun, they set sail to avenge the deaths of their comrades. Having lost the Gneisenau, Vittorio Vinetto, Yamato, and the three Lutzows found themselves in an environment even richer in targets. It was decided that the best defense was to attack and spread confusion. Yamato proceeded to chase the Prince of Wales again, but peeled off when a wounded cruiser was spotted. Yamato circled the cruiser to bring her sidemounts to bear on the exposed underbelly of the listing Chicago and fired into the cruiser until she paid a visit to Davey Jones. Yamato then went looking for other targets of opportunity and soon found herself the only Axis ship on the water, a very uncomfortable position to be in. Yamato emptied her guns into the Allied fleet and went on "five". The Allies attempted to corner Yamato, but she was able to power her way through the road blocks and went off "five" with the lightest damage of the week.


The end of fleet battle one added 5,750 points to the Axis lead and demonstrated that even outnum-

I was able to get some good stern shots off at Ali's carrier and may have contributed to the sink. The rest of my time was taken up with, "OK, now what do I do?" I can say a few things with certainty: some Allied convoy ships were launched and some of them sank, Bremen made a good attempt at pretending to be several convoy ships, and I didn't spend too much time patching afterward. Two thumbs up.

By Nobody. I had no authors for Wednesday, and I visited Andersonville, site of Union prisoner of war situations. I will make a few points about night battle. He tossed them into the lake where they blinked just below the surface of the water. I saw him deploy them and then I watched the captains sail by the first one on their way to battle. Some wondered who sank, and reaffirmed where their own ships were. It was kind of cute.

A problem for most night battlers is enemy identification. Lars' ship engaged us, and we did not necessarily know who's ship was whom's, but we did know Lars' was the only target around. Kevin Bray became the human radar and constantly described the location and direction of Lars' ship (his ship's name is something like Harry Bellephonte, but no Harry). This reconnaissance was very helpful, and a few of us decided that we had only one mission, sink Lars.

Lars' ship started pumping early on and it was like sharks smelling blood, a kill was occurring! Lars declared his five and like a dying elephant returning to the bone pile to die, Lars' ship dragged itself into a corner of the lake to sink. Blasted into consciencness by our guns, she turned and sailed into the wind, waves slipped over her bow, then over the ship. I think he had only 19 seconds remaining in his five. Where there was once a ship, a hope, only the dark waters of night battle remained. No ship, no hope.

Once again, night battle belonged to the Axis. I think it's because we are "the light"

# MWC Boad Of Directors minuts.

Here are the results of the MWC BOD Annual meeting, held on Wednesday, July 12, 2000, at the Nats location in Perry, Georgia.

Of the 11 members of the MWC BOD, 10 were in attendance at the meeting. In addition, a number of MWC members also attended.

On the issue of chapter or site insurance, it was decided to make a minor bylaw change and have the site host become re-

sponsible for obtaining site insurance for sanctioned events on public property. The BOD will assist the site host in contacting J.A. Price to get the site registered.

In setting up the regions for the upcoming BOD elections, it was decided to go with five regions for the present. The following regions were approved:

Region 1 (19 members): Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota.

Region 2 (16 members): Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Maine

Region 3 (31 members): North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida.

Region 4 (28 members): Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Alabama.

Region 5 (16 members): Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, California, Nevada, Utah, Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico.

It was decided to add members from outside the United States to the region closest to them.

A random procedure was used to determine the length of terms for the initial election, after this year only 1/3 of the board will be up for election each year. It was decided that for this initial election, the largest vote getter in each region would be awarded the longest term, and the runner up would serve the shorter term.

The BOD then discussed and voted in a procedure for replacing a BOD member who a motion was made and passed that a CBS cannot complete his term. The BOD will appoint a person from the region to serve until the next election when the region can vote for a replacement.

It was decided to allow Nats attendees who are leaving Nats early but do have voting rights, to register their votes on the rule proposals before they leave.

On the subject of Nats 2001, two sites

were being offered. Houston is a wellknown site that has much to offer. The new proposed Missouri site is being tried out in a Regionals early in September. It was decided to await the reports back on the use of this site after this Regional before making the final decision.

On the subject of the changes made to the Ship List for 2000, and the proper procedure for updating in the future, it was decided to allow the BOD (and thus the Ship List Committee) to place Ship List Issues directly on the ballot for the members to approve. This allows the committee to continue their work of updating and documenting the ship list right up to the time that the ballot is sent, while still giving the membership the final vote. It was decided to have the items which were changed without approval for the 2000 Ship List to be placed on the final ballot for the year 2000.

The subject of the twelve month waiting period for voting rights was next on the agenda, and a motion to drop the period was made and passed. Much discussion ensued, and a vote taken. The motion failed to pass, and the waiting period will remain in effect.

The subject of the number of votes needed to change the CBS rules was next on table. After much discussion of possible methods, rule change would pass with a 2/3 vote of the returned ballots.

It was decided that the regional frequency lists served little purpose, and to drop them. Instead, the frequency list for sanctioned events is to be handled by the site host. It was thought that a list of available frequencies available to each captain and maintained by the MWC on their website would be of more use to a site host trying to solve

frequency conflicts. The MWC Vice President will still maintain the frequency list for Nats attendees.

In the case where a new application for membership and a Nats attendance fee are received but cannot be processed in time to allow attendance at the upcoming Nats, it was decided that it was the responsibility of the MWC BOD screening committee to inform the applicant that the problem existed. No deadline for sending in a membership application would be set.

It was also decided to record BOD rule interpretations, decisions, and policies on the MWC website, at a location available only to MWC members. It was also suggested to include these in the rules packet.

Next were some requests for rule interpretations. A member had asked if the ships moved from the light cruiser categories to the heavy cruiser categories in the 2000 ship list should now get 23 second speed. The board ruled that the movement was not authorized and that the ships should still be considered to be at their 1999 location and values for the present time. It was also noted that the issue was also to be on the final rules ballot for the members to approve or disapprove.

The next rules question came from James Foster and involved an the question over when is a casement gun a casement gun, and when is it superstructure? The issue as presented (in a multipage booklet) contained enough variables that the Board requested that a committee be formed of members knowledgeable in the subject, to either make an interpretation or a rule proposal to clarify the issue.

# **MWC Fleet Battle #4 Thursday**

The week's battling moved into Thursday and a Final Victory was still in sight for both fleets. Both fleets were also operating at near full-strength as a result of effective battle damage repair or the use of back-up ships coming off the shelf. Weather was not a factor, with no more than light breezes at any one time.

Tactics for both fleets were following familiar patterns: The Allies again fielded a balanced A and B fleet composition, whereas the Axis A and B fleets were, simply put, either gorillas or greyhounds in flavor. Fleet battle sortie #1A pitted the Axis gorillas (Bad moniker? You decide.) against the Allied A fleet. New arrival Chris Stossen's USS Michigan was first to be tested by Axis gunnery, and went under at the 10 minute mark. Judging by pump stream activity alone at sortie's end, both fleets exchange of fire was telling, but with no ships showing excessive damage. Fleet battle sortie #1B featured the Axis greyhounds and a balanced Allied squadron. The Axis greyhounds performed well, peppering the 24 second Allied ships in close pursuit and ever-widening the gap from the slower Allies. Sortie #2A was now good to go. Fleets collided and up went the pump streams. Dana Graham's slick-looking Prince of Whales now caught the attention of an Axis squadron. PoW gave as good as she got (gotta love those guad sterns) but was sent to the bottom by sheer weight of

Axis shell and numbers. Lief Goodson's Bayern suffered a similar demise by Allied hands. This writer also breathed a sigh of relief as his timer chimed on. Sortie #2B put the Axis greyhounds to the test again. Steve Reichenback's Sharnhorst gets sandwiched while making a turn, yet manages to break free, only to sink some ten yards later from fatal wounds. Pretty roll and sink. Film at 11. But the carnage continued. Dave Au's VDT was ramsunk buy sibling Chris' lowa, but the tough little Von Der Tann was recovered with no damage and was sent out again to finish the battle. Axis and Allied timers soon began to click off to zero and ships began coming (thankfully) off the water. Official scoring for Fleet Battle #4 shows: Axis (damage/points awarded)20365/23045. Allied 23645/19565. It was yet another 'squeaker' between the two fleets.

Allied fleet A vs. Axis fleet B kicked off the afternoon's battling. The first thing that was observed by this writer was, 'where \*is\* everybody?' A close (well, not very close) inspection of the nearby men's room revealed several Allied captains resolutely seated and enjoying the facility's sumptuous comforts. With the opposition thus occupied, the Axis launched their convoy ship Bremen in hopes of snagging a few easy convoy runs. Regardless of their temporarily depleted numbers, the Allies began pouring fire into Bremen with great gusto. To the Axis' dismay, the pre-recorded speeches of the Fuhrer emitting from the Bremen's audio system had little effect in diminishing the volume of Allied fire. So much for psych warfare. The Allied convoy ships were also coming out in a near flood, with some very pretty looking cargo ships and

CVEs. Survival rates were a rough 50/50 for the Allied convoy runners, but they were still scoring points. With the Axis only having one convoy ship, Bremen enjoyed a well coordinated patching crew between runs, with as many as five Axis at a time administering repairs to the big ship. Thus attended to, Bremen made one full run and four half-trips, one trip of which was done with the ship in reverse (loss of forward power) with Jim Pate and Brian Finster providing tugboat service. Bremen's charmed life ended at the close of Campaign 2A, however. It was challenged for hull hardness and it failed 3/3. Fleet Thibault and John Whitsell earn mention in eliminating the Axis shore targets. With one half hour's time remaining, the Allied ships patrolling their home base waters began a concentrated effort of provoking Axis ships to battle by making firing passes at them. Also, since the campaign had begun not one Allied convoy ship had hit the water. So, a chess

game, of sorts, developed between the Axis ships defending themselves and conserving ammo for convoy targets and the Allied Home Fleet blasting away at the Axis with any barrel that could be brought to bear. With about eight minutes remaining, one Allied cargo ship appeared ready to launch...and waited in the docks. Two Axis Nagatos and one Nassau still reported good ammo stocks and battery power, which was apparently good enough to prevent an Allied convoy run before the campaign time ran down. Campaign ended with an Axis assault on the few remaining Allied shore targets, but the expiration of time and some Allied tugboating of Axis shooters prevented all the targets from going down. Official scoring for Campaign #2 shows: Axis (damage/ points awarded) 4500/5250. Allied 5850/3901.


