


FRIDAY AT NAT'S

It had been the most closely fought Nat's since the hobby began. Victory and defeat had come down to the last battle. Both the Allies and Axis had accumulated over 50,000 points during the week, and the Allies lead by just 2,250. This Nat's had been a battle of strategy like none before, and this last battle had strategists on both sides scheming late into the night. Both the Axis and Allies divided their fleets into a "offensive" and "defensive" sub-fleet, assigning the task of minimizing their own damage to the defensive sub-fleet members, and the task of maximizing the enemy's damage to the offensive sub-fleet members. Before the battle had begun, both the Axis and the Allies had hoped to match their offensive fleet against the enemy's defensive or "dove" fleet. However, at the last minute a change in the Axis High Command's strategy left the match-up as offensive verses offensive and defensive verses defensive.

Fleet Battle A began pretty much like everyone had expected defensively. Since Terry Keef was captaining the Vanguard for the first time he was a popular target, but managed to stay out of too much trouble. Most the ships stayed close to the grate end of the lake with the Allied capital ships formed together in a close group. Fluegel used his Bismarck to harass Jim Pate's Indiana as he had in several of the earlier battles. From time to time an Axis ship would try to attack one of the Allied ships on the fringes, but was rebuffed by the many Allied stern guns. On one occasion, the Lutzow (Wade) lingered too long behind the Indiana's triple stern guns. At the other end of the lake, the Bismarck (Lief) was trying to attack the New Orleans and Oregon City with little success. Before long most of the allies were on five, and the Axis gave chase for about 300 hundred yards of shoreline. The sortie ended as a draw, and was the lowest scoring sortie for the week - Axis 945, Allies 935.

Fleet Battle B was a different story! The Axis had planned on making up the 2,250 total point deficient by winning big in the Fleet B battle. With 33 fewer units and 5 fewer ships, the Axis would have their work cut out for them. The Axis High Command knew that in order to win, the Axis would half to sink some Allied ships. The sortie began with both sides looking for cripples to exploit. The Allies were divided into three subgroups, two of 26 second ships and one of 24 second ships. The Axis were also divided into several small teams. Fairly early in the sortie the Allies were provided with their first opportunity when the The Invincible and the Derfflinger went out of control. Pennsylvania made the most of the opportunity as the Derfflinger ran into the weeds. Of particular note during this sortie was the Kongo, which seemed to attack ships with never seen before aggression. The Musashi was a popular Allied target and had difficulty bringing her guns to bare as she was close to shore without much maneuvering room. At one point however, she appeared to be scoring against the Arizona with her stern guns. The Nagato and Hiei seemed to be pressing the attack and doing some damage while taking some also. At some point, the Alabama went dead in the water. However, her Allied teammates prevented any of the Axis ships from exploiting the situation. There were times when the North Carolina seemed to be in trouble and she drew a lot of Axis attention. Again the numerical superiority of the Allies kept any of the Axis from staying in and slugging it out with the North Carolina. Throughout the sortie most the Axis were in constant motion trying to get in close, do damage, and get out, while the Allies hovered in a pack. The sortie ended with no one certain who had won, and a lot of damage on both sides. The damage was as follows:

With the Axis High Command growing increasingly concerned about securing their third straight Nat's victory, a more aggressive strategy was hastily adopted. It was time for the second sortie. and even their defense fleet would be looking for a kill. The second sortie of Fleet Battle A started much the same as had the first sortie. Most of the Allied ships were concentrated in a circle near the grate end of the pond. Noticeably absent from this assembly were any of the Allied ships that had received even moderated damage in the first sortie. Early in this sortie, the Vanguard went out of control, but a few selected ram calls and her teammates kept the Axis from taking advantage of the situation. As in the earlier sortie, the Bismarck (Fluegel) and the Indiana tried to out stern gun each other. Somewhere towards the other end of the lake, the Roma was attempting to attack the Sevestapol and her comrades the New Orleans and Oregon City. Mike Blattau noticed some allies standing at a distance looking at something in the water near shore. They were looking at the Louisville which had run into the weeds. Mike seized this opportunity and piloted his Lutzow to put about a dozen shots below the Louisville's waterline, and her fate was sealed. This event was unnoticed by the other battle participants. In an attempt to force the battle, the Bismarck (Lief) decided to go side to side with the Indiana. It was a fairly even exchange with the Bismarck's dual broadsides matching the super-fast firing Indiana's single sidemount. Then the Indiana maneuvered alongside the Bismarck where the Bismarck's guns couldn't reach the American BB. Most of the rest of the battle had the Axis capital ships trying to bring their broadsides to bare, especially against the Washington, while the allies emptied their stern guns and went on five. Fleet Battle A ended with the following results

SANTA SAYS: Why would you give up being the "King of Baxley" to be just another dime-a-dozen dentist in tomahawk town? Don't be silly!


PAUL "DOC" BRORING: Should I move my practice to Baxley, Ga. and live like a king among the magnolia trees and southern girls?

SANTA SAYS: Only if "King" Purvis moves to Atlanta -there's only room for one bb shooting, battling fool dentist in that red dust area.


CHRIS AU: My new KING GEORGE hull doesn't turn very well -- any ideas from your brilliant elves?

The Axis had won Fleet Battle A by 540 points and were ahead in Fleet Battle B by 20 points, narrowing the overall Allied lead to just 1,690 points! Like in real war, in the confusion of the day the Axis failed to realize how close to overall victory them really were. Consequently, they made a fatal strategy error. Sensing that they were even farther behind than they had been at the beginning of the day, the Axis developed an "all or nothing" strategy. The Axis would enter the second sortie of Fleet Battle B with a kill or be killed attitude that would determined the outcome of Nat's.

Meanwhile, the Allied Admiral surveyed the pit area to determine which of the Axis ships had the most damage. That ship was the Kongo, which was selected as the primary Allied target for the second sortie. The allies felt if they could put the Kongo down and minimize their own damage, they could carry the day and the week. Their strategy would be simple.

So victory or defeat at Nat's had come down to this - the last sortie of the last battle. What was about to happen would determine bragging rights for the next year, as well as providing material for epic legends to be enjoyed by future generations.

CHRIS PEARCE: What ship should I build for 1993 -- I'm so confused.

BRIAN CRAVEN: The hull on my SOUTH DAKOTA is too hard -- what should I use to cover her and remain legal?


SANTA SAYS: How about the annual financial report from Delta Airlines -- that seems to be the weakest material I know of (ask Baker, he knows).

There were 18 sinks in fleet battles at the 1992 Nat's, compared to 22 sinks at the previous Nat's. This year's sinks include: Fleet 2A - Hindenburg, Warspite & Derfflinger; Fleet 3A - Bismarck (Lief) & Abu Kuma; Night Fleet - Abu Kuma; Fleet 4B - Lion, Bismarck (Lief), Lutzow (Wade) & Oregon City; Fleet 5A - Alabama, North Carolina, Sevestapol, Louisville; Fleet 6A - Louisville; Fleet 6B - Kongo, Hiel & Vittorio Veneto. If there is space, Fluegel will include a summary of individual scores and fleet scores.

WADE "SUGAR" KOEHN: Send me \$\$ so I can complete my BISMARCK in time for the 1993 Nats here in "Big D". JAY EDWARDS: I need a new pump switch. My VV is a real jewel except for the pump switch.



take about four minutes total.

Both areas are covered and have cement floors, electrical outlets, and a PA system. There's a bathroom very close. Soft drinks and ice will be free all day at lakeside, plus a water fountain.

Directly on the water there are two docks,

one is covered, and both have electrical plugs. These are excellently positioned to cover all viewing of the main lake. We would like to reserve at least one of these for the video cameras. BRING A TRIPOD FOR YOUR CAMERA. I know you can see all of the action from either of the positions, unless you want a close-up of a sink far away.

I think I can speak for everyone when I say I'm tired of seeing the ground, the sky and someone's back when I watch a NATS tape. Also I needed some Damamine for motion sickness when I watched '92 NATS tape. Please bring a tripod, or talk to Brian or I and we'll see what what we can come up with. Also there's two volleyball courts, and a


basketball court right beside the tables if your looking for something to pass the time. There's a pool also at lakeside, but Brian and I aren't sure if we can use it or not. We're looking into

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HULL PATCHING By FAB Baker

Have you ever sat there at the pond with scissors in hand, dope bottle open, and brush in mouth as the ever present wind wafts your freshly cut patch to parts unknown and wonder if there might be a better way? It's happened to I've tried pre-cutting my patch material and putting it into an old clippard parts box. about. Very convenient to carry entertaining to watch the wind carry about 30 of your pre made patches out on to the pond. I've also tried bringing a hunk of silkspan and cutting each patch out. By the end of weekend my patch material looks like a relief map of the moon.

The solution? The first step is to obtain a Scotch brand refillable 3/4" tape dispenser. Mine is catalogue number 122. It's a cheapo clear plastic job that is made in two halves. Don't buy one that has one plastic and one paper Anyway, use all the tape up. Take the side. dispenser apart and remove the spool from inside. Get your silkspan out and cut several strips 3/4 inch wide. Use a piece of tape to stick the first strip to the spool and wind it up on to the spool. Use another small piece of tape to stick the next strip to the first ect .. Then put the dispenser back together. Now you can forget the scissors, just pull out the required amount of silkspan and rip it off. I used this system at NATS for the whole week and was very pleased. One helpful hint. If you're Axis you may want to opt for the Catalogue 544. It features 2" tape and number generally used for packages. This ought to speed things up a bit for you guys.

SKUNKWORKS NEWS

The latest scoop on whats new for R/C Warship Combat!

Hello to all of my old friends in this crazy, obsessive hobby. It was so good to see so many of you at this years Nats in Orlando. It was also very good to meet some of the new combatants that have gotten involved since I have been away from the IRCWCC

The decision to attend this years main event was one that I will never regret. In addition to reacquainting myself with everyone, I had the opportunity to learn many new things. For instance, air compressors work just fine and dandy when used in ships that are sailed on windless lakes with calm seas, but they are not worth a flip when they are exposed to water that comes over the bow in waves and leaks into the hull. This was a hard lesson to learn. James Foster and I have been using compressors in several ships here in Springfield over the last year and a half with no problems even remotely approaching the trouble I experienced at the beginning of Nats. Oh well, it hurt to realize that all the work we had done on compressors was for naught, but at least it was a lesson well learned.

On the positive side, I gained considerable exposure to the use of CO2 while there. As I was looking for someone who had a spare tank and needle valve that I could use to install a Freon system in my LUTZOW, I happend by Bart Purvis' table. After a few minutes of conversation he convinced me that CO2 would work in my ship. He then loaned me a 7 ounce CO2 bottle and regulator which fit nicely in the LUTZOW. Needless to say, this setup worked perfectly through the week and helped allay a lot of the fears I had had about the use of CO2.

Since Nats James Foster and I have done considerable experimenting with CO2 and I am now at last convinced that it will be the propellent of choice for the future of this hobby.

A quick note now about what is going on with SKUNKWORKS. For most of this year I have been concentrating on the developement of new products for the hobby, foremost of which is the use of fiberglass hulls. At present there is considerable firsthand combat experience with glass hulls for the USS BROOKLYN & DKM LUTZOW. Both are performing with

flying colors. These hulls offer the advantages of a weight savings which can be converted to batteries, very low maintenance, much more internal room because there are no obstructing ribs in the way of things, and long term durability. Very quick assembly time and just plain EASE of assembly make these ships particularly attractive for beginners. Please note that I assembled the LUTOW completely from scratch in just TWELVE DAYS!!!! Penetrable areas can be covered with either Silkspan, as my LUTZOW was at Nats, or with 1/32 inch balsa like a conventional plywood frame.

In addition to the USS BROOKLYN & DKM LUTZOW molds are currently under construction for the USS HOUSTON, USS NORTH CAROLINA, & the DKM BISMARCK. Thats right, SKUNKWORKS will finally have battleship kits available for the first time, hopefully sometime this spring. For anyone who is not interested in a complete kit, any of these hulls will be available seperately in fiberglass sooner than that. If interested please contact SKUNKWORKS.

Also soon to appear will be BB Cannon systems using CO2 for propellant. Available will be 3.5 oz., 7.0 oz., and possibly 12 oz bottles and the WILLIAMS model 105F regulator with your choice of spring (either 100, 125, or 140 PSI).

Speaking of CO2 regulators, I have been asked by the owner of WILLIAMS to let everyone in the hobby know that SKUNKWORKS MFG. is now the Official Distributor of WILLIAMS products to the hobby. SKUNKWORKS has a large supply of Model 105F regulators with 140 lb spring and 10/32 adapter for immediate shipment to CLUB MEMBERS ONLY for the price of \$20.00 each, freight paid. This price will be good for club members until further notice.

The next item of interest to the club on my list is an improvement in the interruptor of our BB cannon assemblies. The cannons have gone from a small base "sloppy piston" to a large base "sloppy piston" that can be very easily spring loaded with no chance of crushing the spring. Our cannons have gone through several changes over the last four years, hopefully for the better each time. I believe that this latest change makes them more reliably single shot than ever.

Last but not least is the availability of cannons with 75 round coiled magazines. So many people have asked for it, we now have it. My LUTZOW used one in the stern turret at Nats and it works fine. The latest price for a standard 50 round cannon is \$21.35, for

a 75 round cannon, \$23.50.

All of these new items will be featured in SKUNKWORKS MFG. newest catalog available sometime in the spring of 93. As soon as it is printed, all club members will be receiving a copy free of charge. 





All CO₂ systems must have a manufactured pressure regulator set to no more than 150 psi. The pressure regulator must be connected to the tank using only manufactured hoses or unions rated for CO₂. The regulator serves to divide the system into a high-pressure side, consisting of the CO₂ tank and pressure relief valve, and a low-pressure side, consisting of a distribution manifold, poppet valves

or solenoids, and conventional R/C BB cannons. Items on the low-pressure side of the regulator NEED NOT be manufactured or certified.

3.

All refillable CO₂ systems must have a manufactured pressure relief valve (eg.

rupture disk or equivalent) located somewhere on the high-pressure side.

All CO₂ systems must have a 10/32 threaded hole on the low-pressure side that

allows the CD to measure the pressure being delivered to the guns.
5.

The CD, or a person appointed by the CD, is responsible for certifying that all CO_2 systems adhere to the construction rules. Systems that are in violation may not be used during the event.

The CD, or a person appointed by the CD, is responsible for measuring the pressure of the low-pressure side of the CO₂ system whenever it is deemed necessary or when requested by another captain. A system that exceeds the maximum allowed pressure will have its regulator adjusted immediately and a safety chit will be written. If a captain's ship(s) exceeds the maximum pressure more than once in an event, then that captain will be banned from participating during the remainder of the event and the captain's name will be forwarded to the Executive Board for further review.

The Executive Board has the authority to review all violations of CO₂ construction or procedural rules. If they feel that a captain has shown a pattern of CO₂ rule violations, then they have the authority to ban the captain from participating in all club events, for as long as they deem necessary. Furthermore, the Executive Board may review the actions of a CD with regard to the CO₂ rules if requested by a captain in writing. A CD who did not properly adhere to the CO₂ rules may be banned from acting as a CD in future club events, for as long as the Executive Board deems necessary. Such actions require only a simple majority vote on behalf of the Executive Board."
