
Battle Reports

FRIDAY AT NATIONAL'S by Rick Whitsell

Last year Hull Busters proclaimed, "It had been the most closely fought Nat's since the hobby began", and so it was again. Friday morning battle reports indicated only a 1160 point lead by the allies. This represented only little more than a 1 percent margin between the mortal (or is that moral?) enemies after four days of battles. The previous four days saw 100,850 points scored between the two opposing fleets. The late nights of scheming, bragging, boasting, and constant ship repairing, had worn the fleet Captains down to where this one last battle day would seem endless. Before the battle began, the fleet Admirals noted that an excellent performance or a poor performance by anyone could make the difference in the war since it was so close. Pressure to find an edge was weighting heavy in the minds of both sides. It was even reported that both sides resorted to eavesdropping at hotel room doors to eek out any bit of information that would



help settle the score favorably. Several Allied Captains had painted "nose art" in the form of shark's teeth on the brow of their ship to further escalate the combat fever of their comrades. As if on que, more spectators than usual gathered in the Texas heat to watch the final showdown after TV reporters filmed and played the drama of the day before on the tube. Would these curious spectators see a good show?



Allied Strategy was essentially unchanged since Tuesday. Launch together in the big north pond to take advantage of the sea room. Keep the slower ships together to increase firepower in the killing zone. Use the faster ships to cutoff the hit and run tactics the axis fleet was known to employ.

Axis Strategy was a repeat of the day before. If any allied ships launch in the south lake, the Axis would suddenly shift lakes and all launch their ships with the few unfortunate Allied ships and "tear them apart". If the allies launched in the north pond, the axis command would go to a team approach and control zones with a few allied ships to be singled out for destruction. Control of the bridge sea lanes also figured importantly to the axis command.


IN BUILDING THIS SHIP E HAD, THE KEEL TOO BIG,

The Allies and Axis all launch in the North pond. The Allies have already suffered a crippling blow when two ships, Vanguard and South Dakota, can't make the "let's fight bell" and the Pennsylvania quickly loses her CO2. Rats, the Allies are down 30 percent in firepower before any real fighting starts! The combat starts out cautiously, just as predicted, but soon the battle tactics start to show. Willard's Washington has been selected as an Axis target and is being pursued by the Nagato, Mogami, and Mutsu. Washington returns fire at the swarming Japanese and continues to maneuver to evade the many flying shells. Bismarck (F) and Scharnhorst are playing cat and mouse with the North Carolina exchanging gun fire on the move. Suddenly, the N. Carolina's Captain has a mind burp while chasing the Scharnhorst and turns to port into the triple stern guns of the Scharnhorst. Scharnhorst obliges and places many volleys into the North Carolina as she turns. The damage to N. Carolina was noted by the Axis and attention was turned to swarming the crippled ship. Four ships dog the cripple keeping her away from the Allied center. With the clock showing 1 minute and 30 seconds left on her 5, North Carolina sinks surrounded by 3 hovering Axis ships (Scharnhorst, Bismarck (F), Bismarck (K)). Washington again is the axis target as battle resumes. Axis ships chase to catch and kill her before her 5 minutes runs out. Meanwhile, the Allied center ships pound Moltke for most of the sortie with Bismarck (M) often shielding and covering for the now hard pumping ship. During the melee now ensuing near the bridge, Valiant finds herself engaging Moltke, Bismarck (M), and Nagato. Shots are exchanged among the ships and all seems fine until Valiant's pump dies. Was this a case of the "Golden BB" or "let's talk trash"? (note: Chris tells me it was broken pump rotor time) In any case, the Valiant dies too, as she rolls to starboard and sinks. The Sverige (pronounced scourge) snakes through the formations twisting and turning to harass allied ships with her 3 shots and escape tactics. The sortie finally winds down since only Indiana and Invincible remain on the pond. Both are on 5 and Indiana slips under the bridge to safety

...to fight again. Finally, attention shifts to Invincible as 6 Axis ships try without success to pin her and sink her. The Axis rejoice at the lopsided victory. Two Allied ships sunk and no Axis sinks.

BETWEEN THE SORTIES:

Deskins

The situation for the Allies was indeed grim. Two ships sunk, two ships barred from the second sortie, and four ships with heavy damage. Even without the sinks, the Axis was ahead in damage points. The reduction of Allied gun tubes significantly reduced the total damage inflicted on the Axis ships. In retrospect, the Axis strategy was a good one. Axis Captains had spreadout on both sides of the pond to better hunt ships by always having a Captain close to the targeted Allied ship. This made shooting much more accurate.

SORTIE 2 OF FLEET 5:

Axis Strategy was to setup squads around the lake and play zone defense. The same tactic of East and West side wings on the pond was used for deployment of the ships. Washington was again a target of the axis especially now that she was hurt in the first sortie. The Axis re-

TAIL APPEARED, OFF IT WENT IN A CLOUD OF SMOKE AND SPARKS. ON RETURNING THE THROTTLES TO NEUTRAL NOTHING HAPPENED EXCEPT THE SHIP CONTINUED ITS HEAD LONG RUN AT BACK WALL OF THE POOL. I HAD SOME LUCK THE WIND WAS AT MY BACK WHICH WAS MOVING THE SHIP TO THE OTHER SHORE. AFTER A 1/2 MILE RUN AROUND TO THE WINDWARD SHORE I FINIALY CAINED CONTROL AGAIN. I HAD A LOT OF FUN (AFTER I RAISED THE ATTENNA) RUNNING MY SHIP AROUND AND AROUND, STOPPING AND

STARTING AND BACK AND FORTH. I WAS WHOLE AGAIN.

IT IS ACTUALY AT THIS POINT IN MY SHIP BUILDING CAREER THAT I ATTENDED THE SEPT. 18th MEET IN SPRINCFIELD. AT THIS MEET I OBSERVED FELLOWSHIP, A SENCE OF PURPOSE, A OUTLET FOR MY NEEDS. THE TATICS USED ESCAPED ME. IT LOOK LIKE A CENERAL MELEE OF SHIPS DARTING IN AND OUT, BOW/STERN CHASES AND ERROR OF BEING BROADSIDE TO THE STERN OF A LARGER SHIP. I EXPECTED TATICS OF "A LINE AHEAD", "A LINE ABREAST" "CROSSING THE "T", A HEROIC DASH OF A SMALLER SHIP AT A BATTLE LINE. HOWEVER ONE BATTLE DOES NOT MAKE A WAR, AND IT MAY NOT BE EASY TO REMAIN AFLOAT.

I WOULD LIKE TO THANK THE CAPTIANS WHO TOOK THE TIME TO ALLOW ME TO VIDEO THEIR SHIPS AND TO ANSWER MY DUMB QUESTIONS. MY HAT IS OFF TO THEM AND TO ANYONE WHO HAS BUILT A R/C COMBAT SHIP. I'M LOOKING FORWARD TO MY FIRST SORTIE AND MEETING THE OTHER CAPTAINS.

I AM ON TRACK NOW WITH MY SHIP, I'M INTO THE SECOND REBUILD. I HAVE SHORTENED THE DRIVE SHAFTS TO 5", ELIMINATED THE SPEED CONTROLLERS, ADDED TWO 1500 MAH BATTERIES FOR MOTOR PROPULSION, BUILT A WATER PROOF BOX FOR SERVOS AND RECEIVER ONLY, THINNED DOWN THE RIBS AND KEEL, RESKINNED THE HULL, AND LASTLY CONE TO A GEAR DRIVE FOR THE RUDDER.

ACAIN MY THANKS TO ALL FOR THEIR HELP.

BOB EAKIN ROOKIE CAPTAIN "HMS DEVONSHIRE" alized that the Allies must be on the offensive to have any possibility to win. Finally, the Captains were admonished to avoid Indiana and any ship, if any, she was guarding.

Allied Strategy was summarized as follows: Take your shield to battle and come home victorious ...or on your shield! Take no prisoners. The Allied command designated Moltke as a target since she was hurt in the first sortie.

Again the fleets both deployed in the North pond. This time the Allied and Axis ships were evenly spreadout with opposing ships intermixed. No "side" was distinguishable at the start (must have been confusing for the specta-The sortie started fast with each opposing fleet quickly engaging. Washington was immediately being chased by Nagato and Bismarck (K). Indiana locks on target ship Moltke and starts to dog her. Tiger and Invincible join the fight to get the Moltke. Moltke takes shots here and there, pumping hard, as she tries to evade the Allied ships. Moltke gets much needed help from defending ships Bismarck (M) and Nagato. All ships are now trading fierce sidemounts trying to defend Moltke or sink her. During this action, Mogami runs into an intense fire fight with Pennsylvania and Invincible. Each ship takes multiple hits in the fight. Someone yells that Bismarck (M) is sinking but no one pays attention since Moltke has now taken enough lead to sink her and all

But 962 Allied eyes focus on the death scene. battle once again restarts and the French (pronounced Frog) ships have returned to Bismarck (M) determined that she is in fact hurt. "Hey Allies, somebody sink this Bismarck over here" is finally heard and sure enough she is riding low in the water! The Allies rush to the scene to assist the French ship only to arrive too late. Bismarck (M) slips below the waves. perstructure parts litter the surface. As battle resumes, the Axis have now found a hurt ship. The Invincible has accumulated enough damage from both sorties to max-out her pumping capacity ... a few more hits could sink her. At times four Axis ships hunted the Invincible. Bismarck (F), SMS Lutzow and Mogami still had shells to pump into her as she twisted and turned to avoid the fatal shot. Finally, Invincible could take no more as she settled lower in the water and then sank (1 minute 30 sec. remaining on her clock). Indiana and Tiger were briefly pursued by Lutzow, Mutsu and the two remaining Bismarck while on 5, but both escaped any further major damage. The remaining ships wait out their 5 to end the sortie.

Now the battle and this years NATS were over. The 18,880 points scored showed that the final battle was intensely fought by both sides especially given the fact that several ships did not make the final battle or had been sunk. The Axis had won the final battle and 1993 NATS. The years bragging rights belong to the

- 6. Affiliate with a national hobby club for purposes of obtaining liability insurance (so public lakes could be used). The insurance is mandatory for use of many public lakes. Without these lakes there could have been no viable hobby.
- 7. Put out a Newsletter to help combatants keep up with events and issues that would have effects on the hobby. Without a newsletter word of needed rules changes, new technology, and competition events would not have been able to get around well. Although the hobby was growing without a newsletter, there were definite limits to the size the hobby could grow without it. The hobby probably would have faded away without Fluegel's Hull Busters.

Since Fluegel, Jeff Poindexter, and Stan were the first battlers, they are the ones who could be considered as candidates for "the" Founding Father of R/C Warship Combat. In an attempt to determine who really should be known as the Founding Father the historic part played by Fluegel, Stan, and Jeff Poindexter in these key areas will be discussed in the following narative.

1. Development of the R/C operated automatic Mini-BB-qun for model ships.

First, and most importantly, it took the development of a viable R/C operated multi-shot miniature automatic BB gun that would fit in a reasonable sized model ship. Before there was a need for such a weapon, there had to be someone

to use it. In July 1976, Stan had purchased and given Jeff (Revell USS Missouri) and Fluegel (DKM Scharnhorst) plastic model battleships to motorize and tether. Stan chose the Revell USS Arizona (a beloved model from his early teenage years). Stan showed them how to motorize the models and Fluegel was very creative in designing the tether system. These models were then taken to the North Amarillo Waste Water Final Effluent tank (yes Fluegel worked for the sewer then) and fired upon (from shore) with a daisy BB rifle alternately shared by three battlers. Stan had wanted to do this since the late 1950s. This scheme was successful in getting Jeff and Fluegel hooked on model warfare using plastic model battleships. Soon the limitations of the small plastic models became evident. Stan proposed (escalation) that they build larger non-plastic models and be remotely controlled and that the guns be mounted on the ships (and fired remotely). Stan stated that to make the game viable, the gun had to be a multiple shot unit (automatic) because it would be too much hassel to bring the ships to shore to reload after each shot. Stan further confidently stated that he could come up such a gun that would work. Fluegel provided motivation by saying that Stan could not come up with one. Fluegel had his own ideas. A single shot 12 gauge shot gun shell firing unit. He's always been a strong gun safety advacate. Stan and Fluegel began working on these separate projects in Amarillo, Texas sometime shortly after August 1976. Fluegel gave up his efforts, moved to Beaumont, Texas, (Thank you God for your life saving intervention) and began building and flying radio controlled airplanes. The battle team was broken up by Fluegel's move but, Stan, encouraged by Jeff Poindexter, carried on the development.
